From our Locum Minister

Dear Friends at St Mary's Kirk,

I am writing to you on a Sunday evening from my sofa at what appears to be the end of a beautiful Scottish summer. We just had a few more warm days this week, but now it is starting to feel autumnal and I am for the first time in months using a blanket.

I like autumn. The fresh air, the darker evenings. I like the new apples and am looking forward to all the produce later in the year, to cooler nights and to the glimmer of the lights which will be appearing more and more as the days get shorter. 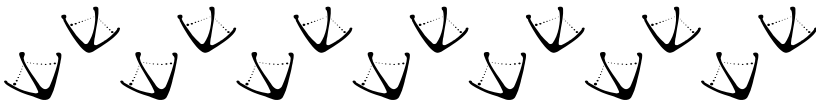

Wednesday Quiet Time

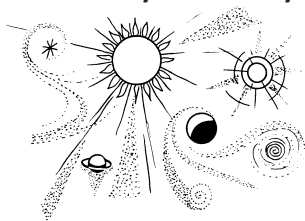
After our summer break, we are very glad to resume our regular monthly Quiet Times on

The Legend of Thaney

The legend of St Thaney who was a princess, the daughter of King Lot, born in Traprain and the mother of St Mungo will be celebrated with two pilgrim walks on Sunday 27th September during Doors Open Day, ending at St Mary's Kirk. There will also be a play in St Mary's Kirk about her life on the following Saturday.

Her Story

She goes by many names: Thaney, Teneu, Denw, Theneva, the list goes on – from Welsh and English to Latin, Scots and Gaelic influences; hers is a story that won't keep still. She is believed to have been the daughter of Leudonus or Lot, the 6th century semi-pagan King of Lothian (Gododdin) from whom the region gets its name. Thaney's home and the seat of the kingdom was at Traprain Law.

According to legend, she was raped at the age of seventeen. On discovering she was pregnant, she was thrown from Traprain Law as punishment, either by her father or on his orders. She survived the fall, only to be placed in a coracle, an oarless boat, and set into the Firth of Forth at Aberlady Bay. She again survived to wash ashore at Culross in Fife, where she was taken in by St Serf, founder of an early Christian church (refounded in 1217-18 by Malcolm I). At Culross, she gave birth to her son, Mungo (Kentigern), who would go on to become the patron saint of Glasgow – as would Thaney, though there her name changed again to Enoch.

Today she is venerated in the Christian faith as Saint Thaney, Protector of the Abused. We hear about her briefly in the *Life of Saint Kentigern*, her son's hagiography (biography of a saint) written by the monk Jocelyn of Furness around 1185. But precious little evidence of her own life has survived the march of time.

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Book Farmacy

The Book Farmacy is a pilot project aiming to bring this non-clinical option for supporting mental health and wellbeing to the farming communities in Orkney, East Lothian and the Scottish Borders this Autumn.



The Book Farmacy pilot in East Lothian seeks pilot participants

Do you have muscle tension? Do you often feel stressed or burnout?

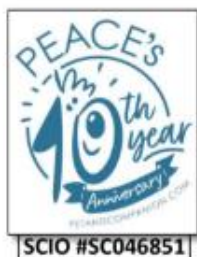
Do you lack quality sleep? Do you need support to 'slow down and switch off'?

Research evidences that reading for even just 6 minutes a day, can help reduce the impact of all of these – and this includes listening to audiobooks. It is very simple. You email BookFarmacy@rhass.org.uk to register interest, you have a chat with one of the Book Farm-assists who will help develop a personalised Book Farmacy Pack for you, it will arrive through your door early September, giving you the autumn to engage with your pack and see what benefit it may bring. The Book Farmacy is supported by the Royal Agricultural Society of Scotland and your local library service.

- Jacqueline, who farms at Tankerness and is an Orkney Book Farm-assist, says *"When I put down my book, or switch off the audiobook, I feel chilled and relaxed and 'switched off' from farming and family life."*
- While David, one of our East Lothian Book Farm-assists, who is a small-scale beef and sheep farmer at Soutra shares, *"I read books and listen to audiobooks. It makes a change from phone calls to suppliers, contractors and vets. I generally listen to audiobooks when delivering livestock to a mart or a customer. I probably average 5 hours a week engaging with stories and I nearly always feel more relaxed, though occasionally frustrated if the author hasn't sewn up all the threads by the end!"*

Reading and audiobooks are an affordable, accessible option to support and improve wellbeing with no negative side effects. Worth a try. Email
